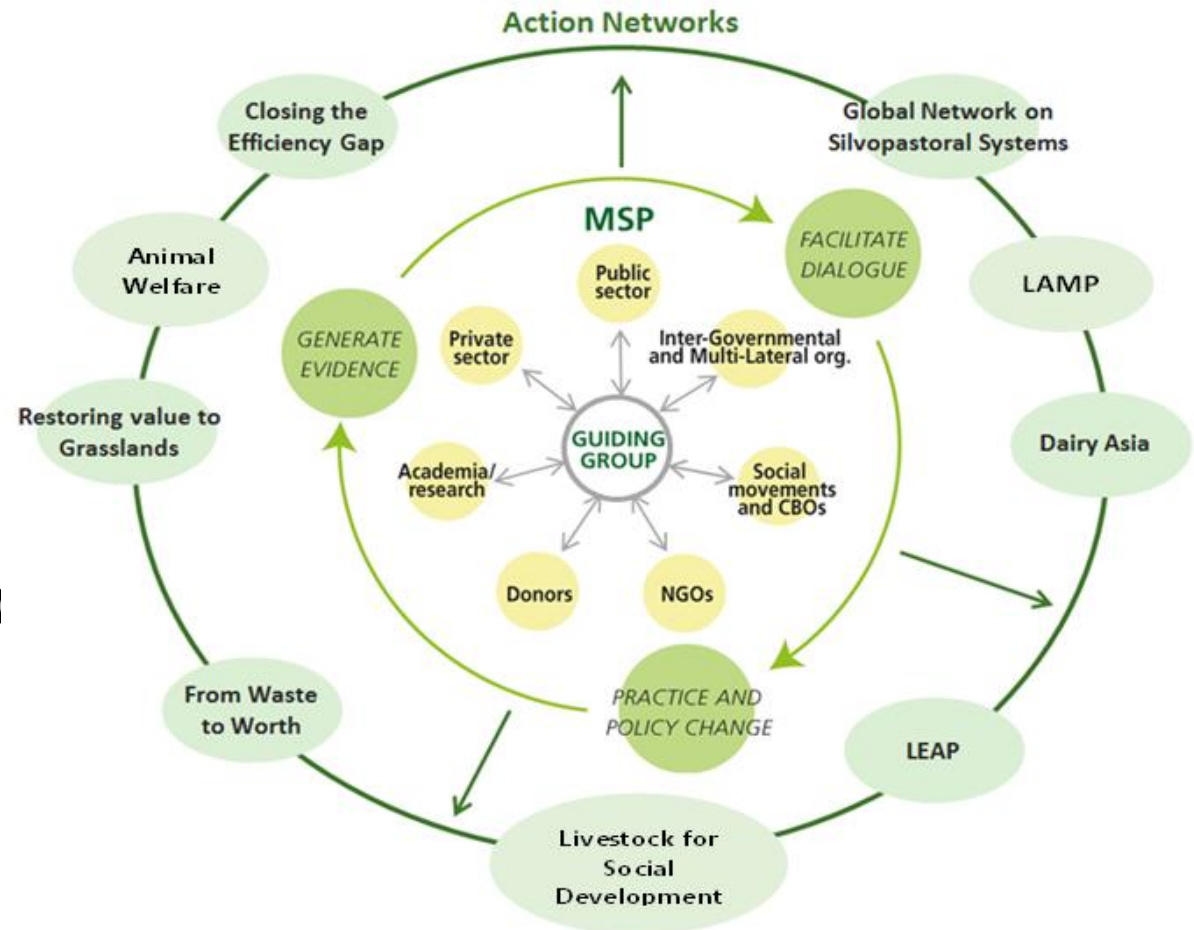
1997 – 2005	LEAD (Livestock Environment and Development)

Governance



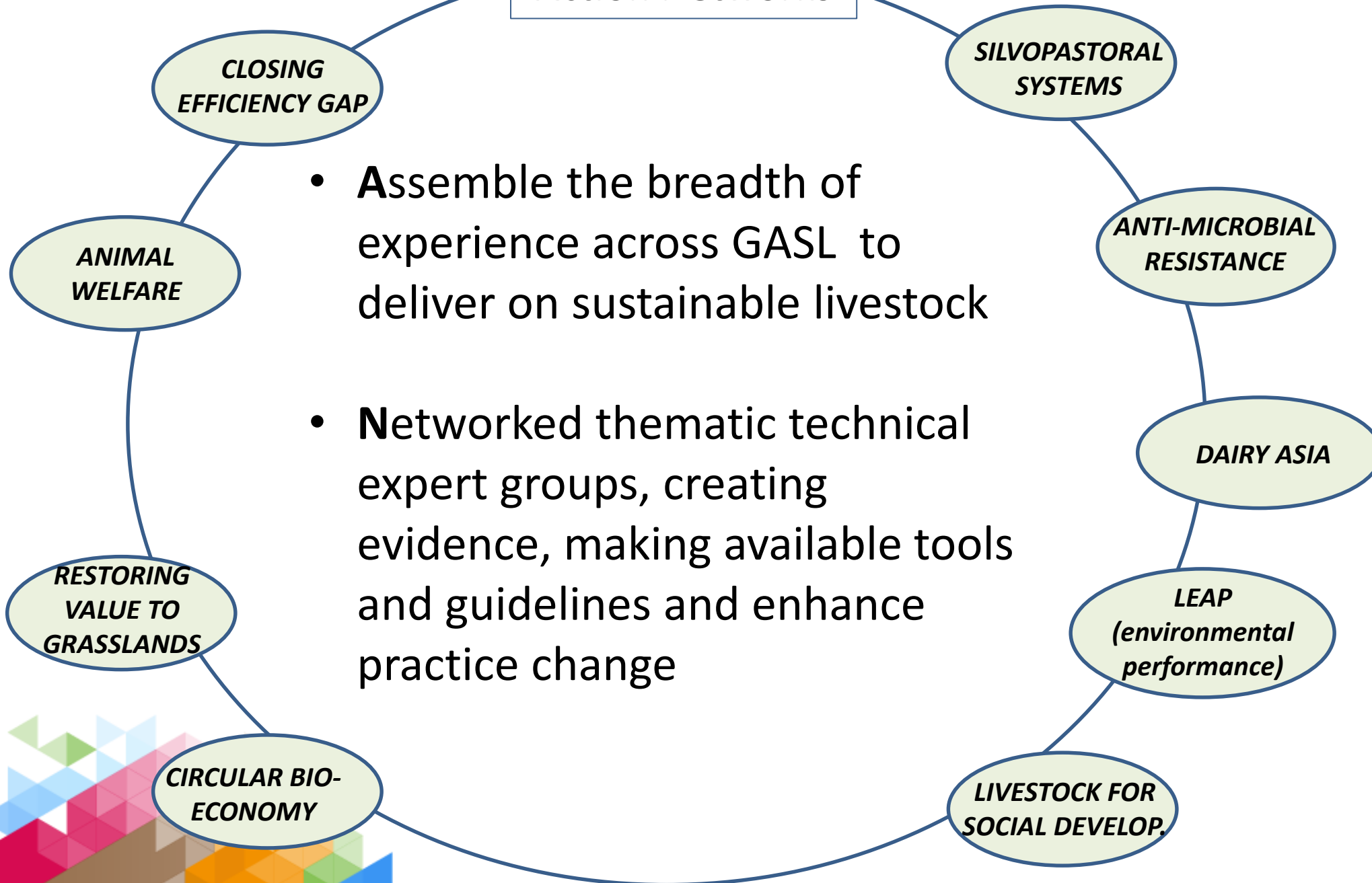
Clusters: Assure inclusive participation of representatives of all sectors of society.

Secretariat: Hosted by FAO in Rome

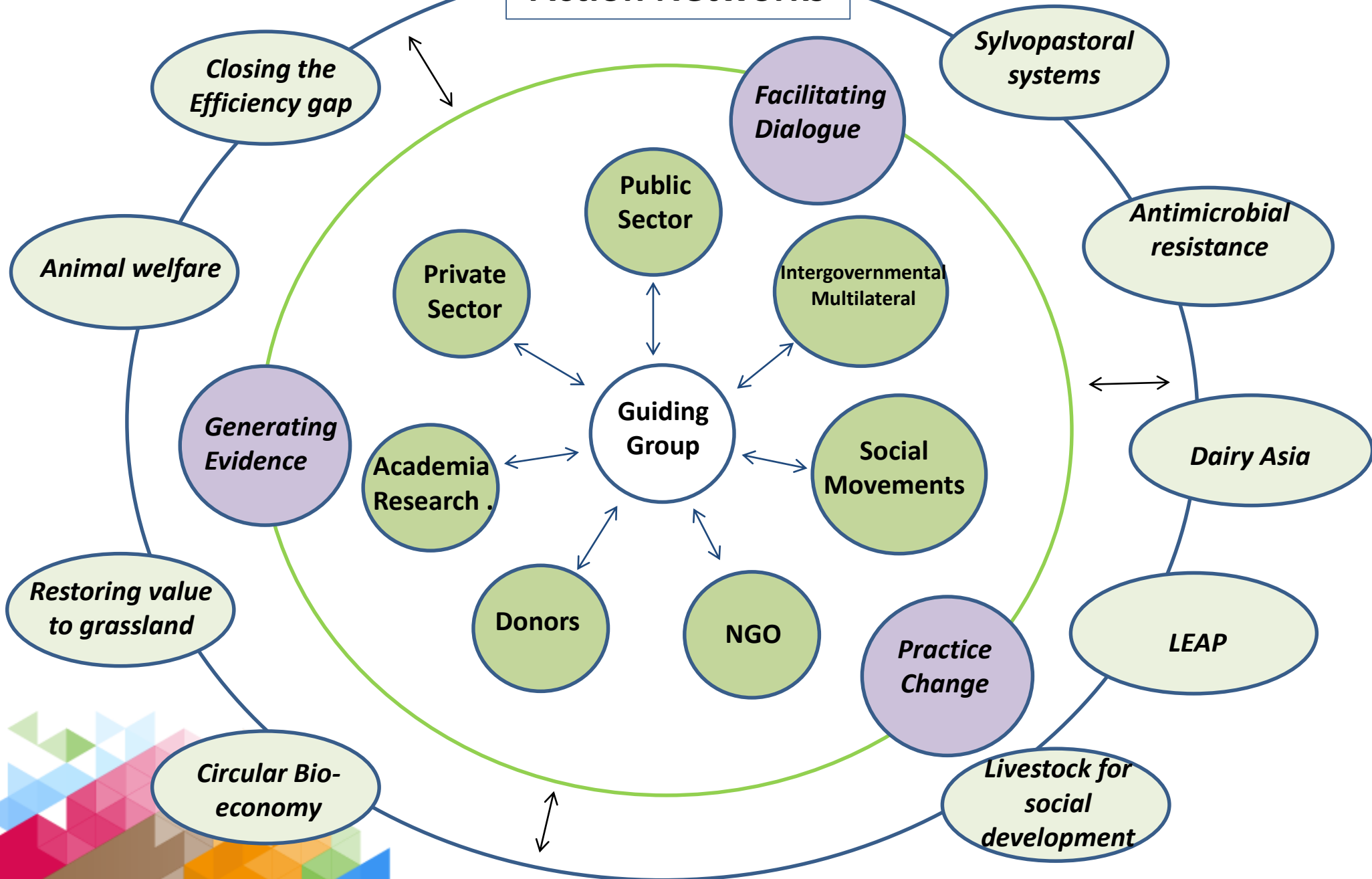
Rules and Procedures: The institutional reference frame for the Global Agenda.

Action Networks

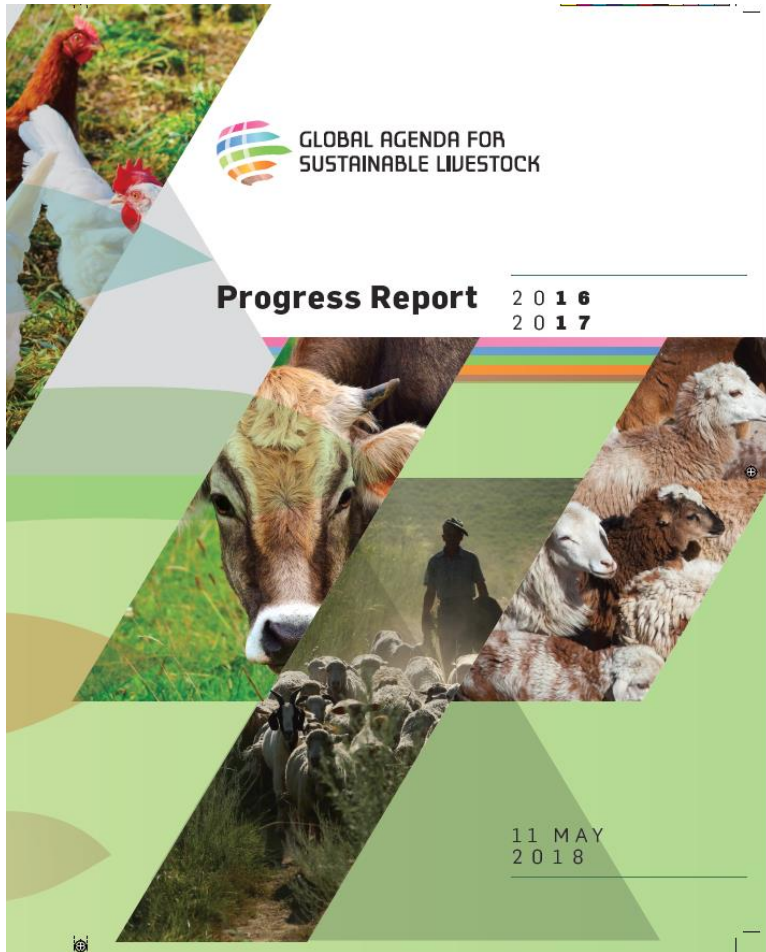


- Assemble the breadth of experience across GASL to deliver on sustainable livestock

Progress in the right directions

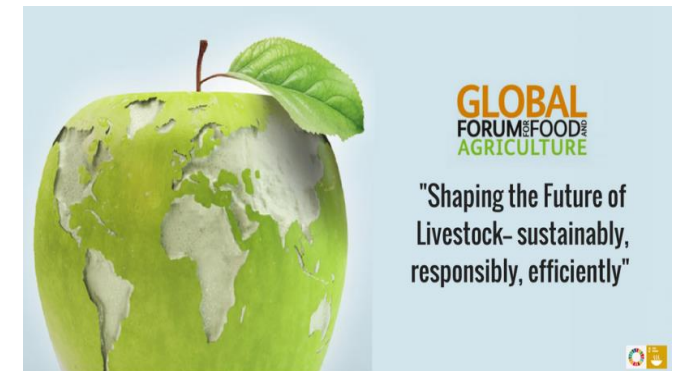


- Consolidation of a Multi-Stakeholders Partnership

Recent Achievements

- 2016 FAO Committee of Agriculture (COAG) endorsement and support
- Eight Multi-stakeholder partnership (MSP) meetings
- Advocacy on the importance of a sustainable livestock sector, the Global Agenda claims some credit for the importance of Livestock issues in:



Strengths

- Functioning Multi-stakeholder partnership with a stable governance
- Broad, motivated and growing membership
- A small reliable donor group providing the financial (minimal) base
- Recognized advocate for sustainable livestock (not for livestock per se!)
- A proven means to provide and deliver solutions
- Attracting national and regional interest in livestock-oriented multi-stakeholder partnerships (Mongolia, East Europe, Central Asia, Caucasus, Latin America)



Weaknesses of the Global Agenda

- Rather complex structure
- Cluster representation is not yet well balanced
- Activities of Action Networks differ considerably in intensity and reach
- There is content overlap between Action Networks
- Important elements of the Livestock value chain are not or only marginally covered (e.g. nutrition, food loss and food waste, consumer expectations)
- Funds to finance core functions of the Global Agenda are always scarce



Major challenges ahead

- **Visibility:** GASL and its work has to become more visible.
- **Presence in international and global fora:** GASL has to improve its presence in international and global fora and explicitly offer to contribute to their agendas
- **GASL as partner in policy dialogue:** GASL has to become more proactive in supporting national policies leading to a sustainable livestock sector development



Major challenges ahead

- **Missing stakeholders:** During the Action Plan period 2019 – 2021 GASL needs to improve its interaction and collaboration with so far missing stakeholders such as stakeholders in nutrition, consumption, and food waste
- **GASL needs to focus its activities:** GASL has to improve its impact by better deliver on defined work areas and focus themes.
- **GASL** is challenged in harnessing its diversity towards impact

Focus Themes

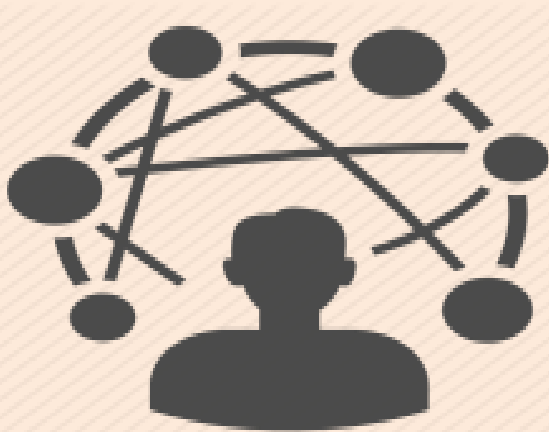
Facilitate policy dialogue, policy development and sharing of experience









Strengthen communication and networking
